

J-1 Visa Exchange Visitor Program Survey

Absence of Crucial International Exchange Visitors Devastates Seasonal Businesses Across the United States

From September 13 to October 15, 2021, the Alliance for International Exchange surveyed 665 seasonal businesses and summer camps nationwide, of which 72% are small businesses. Below are responses from these businesses, 50 in New Jersey.

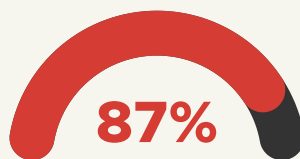

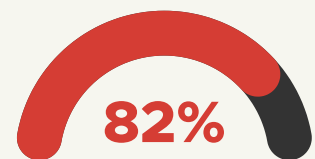

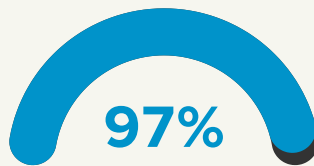
- PUBLIC DIPLOMACY IMPACT -

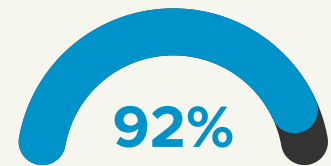
