

J-1 Visa Exchange Visitor Program Survey

Absence of Crucial International Exchange Visitors Devastates Seasonal Businesses Across the United States

From September 13 to October 15, 2021, the Alliance for International Exchange surveyed 665 seasonal businesses and summer camps nationwide, of which 72% are small businesses. Below are responses from these businesses, 55 in New York.

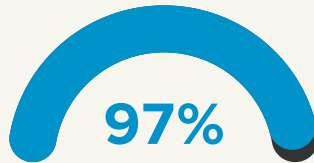
- PUBLIC DIPLOMACY IMPACT -

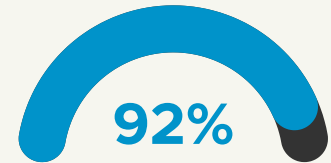
Host employers across America agree or strongly agree that Summer Work Travel and Camp Counselor participants:

“We are located in a small town in the Adirondack Mountains, where it is increasingly difficult to get U.S. based employees. We had more business than ever and less employees to run that business.”

“Our restaurant had to reduce hours and services. Our resort was open but with a significant reduction in services and an uptick in guest complaints. Full time year-round employees experienced high stress and burnout. We absolutely can not operate without the BridgeUSA students!”

- Hotel in Lake Placid, NY

“Due to the staffing shortage we were not able to open all of our camp cabins so we were not able to take as many campers as we would have any other year (lost sales) and parents were also not able to get the child care they needed to be able to fully go back to work.”

“Summer Work Travel students have become life-time friends to many of our U.S. based employees. One of our employees even had the opportunity to visit Kosovo and experience a new culture which would not have been possible without BridgeUSA programs. ”

- Restaurant in Lake George, NY

“We have had to close our restaurant 4 hours early every day, close our kitchens due to cook shortages, we had one new restaurant we were trying to open that we could not because of lack of applicants. Potentially half a million in revenue left on the table and burnout of my current team members.”

“Staffing shortages meant we could not stay open after 5pm, closing the doors on a line of customers many times and losing that extra income.”
